Lessons Learned from My Parents

The first presidential election I remember was when I was seven years old. While I did not fully understand the process or who the candidates were, I distinctly remember that my parents favored one of the candidates, and I was, thus, for that candidate. One day, when I came home from school, I noticed that someone had given my father a political poster for our favored candidate. Before going to bed that night, I proudly placed the poster in my bedroom window, which faced the street in front of our house. When I awoke the following day, the poster was gone. My parents explained their belief that, while we had strong opinions regarding our favored political candidates, our family kept our political opinions to ourselves and did not place signs for political candidates in our yards or homes.

Over the years, I have learned that not everyone shares my parents' views regarding political candidate signs. For many, these signs are visible expressions of civic engagement or freedom of speech. Even though this is not a practice within our family, I deeply respect and appreciate that we live in a country where diverse opinions are not only allowed but embraced.


During election years, we are often asked if Lake Junaluska has a policy regarding political signs. As a not-for-profit, faith-based organization, we do not allow political signs on property owned by Lake Junaluska Assembly. This includes the walking trail, gardens, and along the

state roads that run through our community. Our staff work diligently to remove political candidate signs from Assembly-owned property throughout the election season, and the NC General Statutes provide clear guidance on our right to remove the signs from these areas.

As a community, we do not have a policy prohibiting political candidate signs on private property within the Assembly. This means that some members of our community will choose to place signs for political candidates on their property. We always hope that community members who choose to do so are thoughtful and considerate as they express themselves.

Living at Lake Junaluska for the past 21 years, I have learned that this is a place where, even during election season, we can respect our differences and focus on the things we agree on. We deeply love this place, and every day, we work together to ensure that it is a place of Christian hospitality where lives are transformed through renewal of soul, mind and body. Thank you for your ongoing support of our beloved community and your respect for each other.
